I-95 AT BOYNTON BEACH BOULEVARD — SPRING 2026 PROJECT UPDATE

Friday, Apr. 17, 2026 marks day 250 of 1081, with work 23% completed. Bridge repairs were recently completed on Boynton Beach Boulevard over the SFRTA Railroad just west of I-95, placing westbound traffic back to the original configuration with a free-flowing right turn lane from the I-95 southbound exit ramp to westbound Boynton Beach Boulevard. ONGOING CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITIES

- Traffic railing demolition on the south side of the Boynton Beach Boulevard bridge over I-95
- Temporary lighting and signalization installation
- Excavation work throughout the project limits
- Test pile and pile driving operations on both the north and south sides of the interchange
- Directional boring for ITS installation, drainage installation and gravity wall construction throughout the corridor

EASTBOUND TRAFFIC SHIFT SUNDAY, APR. 19 & UPCOMING CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITIES

- Beginning Sunday night, Apr. 19, the outside lane of Boynton Beach Boulevard just west of NW 8th Street to east of W. Industrial Avenue will be closed with traffic barrels and barrier wall to create a work zone for widening operations on the south side of the project limits, reducing eastbound lanes from three (3) to two (2) in this area
- The barrier wall will continue eastbound and tie into the existing barrier wall at the I-95 interchange
- In conjunction with this configuration, the I-95 southbound entrance ramp from Boynton Beach Boulevard will also have a slight lane shift towards I-95 southbound with barrier wall installed along both sides of the ramp
- I-95 ramp widening operations and reconstruction will be ongoing through the spring season, including retaining wall construction

ANTICIPATED LANE, RAMP AND I-95 CLOSURES

- **I-95 Traffic Impacts:** One lane of I-95 may be closed in each direction beginning at 8 p.m., with up to three lanes closed in each direction, 10 p.m. until 6 a.m., Sunday night through Thursday night. A fourth lane may be closed overnight in each direction, as needed, for traffic shifts and bridge construction operations.
- **I-95 Ramp Impacts:** The I-95 entrance and exit ramps at Boynton Beach Boulevard may have one lane closed nightly as needed, 9 p.m. to 6 a.m., Sunday night through Thursday night. One lane of the ramp will remain open during this time.
- **Full I-95 Ramp Closures:** The I-95 ramps at Boynton Beach Boulevard may close completely, 9 p.m. until 6 a.m., Sunday night through Thursday night. Please note only one I-95 ramp at the Boynton Beach Boulevard interchange is permitted to close at a time. Please follow the marked detour routes and proceed with caution.
- **Boynton Beach Boulevard Traffic Impacts:** Boynton Beach Boulevard may have one lane closed in each direction, with the westbound turn lane to the I-95 southbound entrance ramp closed as needed, 9 p.m. until 6 a.m., Sunday night through Thursday night.
